English 10F is organized into a number of integrated units, each of which corresponds to one or more important themes. Within most units, we will read and discuss a variety of short selections (such as stories and poems). We will also read several longer works in the course, such as Of Mice and Men, by John Steinbeck, and a Shakespearean play, Romeo and Juliet. In each unit, you will complete a variety of writing assignments, and, as well, have many opportunities for viewing, discussion, and creative expression.

Learning and Assessment

There are five main outcomes that guide your learning, and the assessment of your learning, in English 10F. In turn, within these five main outcomes, there are a large number of specific outcomes that we target throughout the course. Here is a brief explanation of the five main learning outcomes:

- 1. **Exploring Ideas** Students will listen, speak, read, write, view, and represent to explore thoughts, ideas, feelings, and experiences.
- 2. **Responding to Text** Students will listen, speak, read, write, view, and represent to comprehend and respond personally and critically to oral, literary, and media texts.
- 3. **Organizing Ideas** Students will listen, speak, read, write, view, and represent to manage ideas and information.
- 4. **Communicating Ideas** Students will listen, speak, read, write, view, and represent to enhance the clarity and artistry of communication.
- 5. **Group/Community** Students will listen, speak, read, write, view, and represent to celebrate and build community.

Important notes:

- You ALWAYS need to have something to <u>write with</u> (pen or pencil) and something to <u>write on</u> (loose-leaf) <u>every day.</u>
- A Dropbox or Drive account is required IF you want to submit work electronically (yay!)
- Assignments can be revised and resubmitted at any time and as often as needed, but this should always be discussed with and cleared by Mr. Robson.
- Students and parents are expected to provide an email address for contact and work/file sharing purposes.
- Students & parents should be in the practice of checking or subscribing to Mr. Robson's web site for class information, deadlines, homework, etc.
- It student login/ID should be kept SECRET and SECURE. Allowing others access to your account can create major problems and should be avoided.
